<p>Annually, Llanelli Town Council carries out a Citizenship and Democracy project called Meet the Mayor.</p> <p>The project involves inviting all eight Town Council area primary schools to visit the Council Chamber to 'Meet the Mayor' and have a session based on the school curriculum, democracy, voting history, citizenship, the importance of partnership working within the Community along with the young person's place in the democratic process. The project is carried out in partnership with Llanelli Community Partnership Volunteers who support the School sessions. The sessions are targeted at Years 5 and 6 in order to meet the curriculum provision on citizenship and to try to ensure that all primary school pupils have an opportunity to visit during their time in Primary School prior to progressing to Secondary School.</p>

This has been done through whole school consultation in developing the Plan and with specific age groups in purchasing items for the playing fields. Best Community Engagement Initiative	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Blaenavon TC • Carmarthen TC • Mumbles CC 	<p>In 2022, successful negotiations with partners allowed Blaenavon Town Council to launch their Blaenavon Befriending Film Club, held on the last Friday of every month at Blaenavon Workmen's Hall Cinema.</p> <p>The club provides an opportunity for residents to enjoy a free screening of a movie and refreshments while also socialising with others in the community. The initiative is widely advertised using the Town</p>

		<p>Council's social media platforms and via posters distributed across the Town.</p> <p>A key aim of the project was to tackle loneliness and social isolation, particularly amongst older residents.</p> <p>The Deputy Mayor of Carmarthen Town Council instigated a community collaboration project with the aim of tackling loneliness in the town. He set about co-ordinating stakeholders in the community to reach out to those in need and close any gaps in support that were identified.</p> <p>In Mumbles, the Underhill project stands as a testament to the power of community engagement, resilience, and the transformative impact of dedicated grant funding. Initiated over two decades ago, the project has reshaped the landscape of Mumbles and become an indispensable part of the community's fabric. This achievement would not have been possible without the visionary support of the Mumbles Community Council, which contributed a pivotal £1.5 million in grant funding.</p>

		<p>during the current cost of living crisis was a major struggle. The Council's partners were.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Torfaen Leisure Trust. • Jenson Travel. <p>In 2023, as a result of successful negotiations with partners, Blaenavon Town Council launched their Community Swimming Initiative which delivered the following outcomes.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Free swimming sessions at Pontypool Active Living Centre during each half term, with an additional session during summer holidays. • Free return bus transport to each session. <p>Consultation with the community in Llanelli identified gaps in relation to provision of organised activities to support community organisations and sports clubs along with the need for stand-alone open community activity across Llanelli.</p> <p>Llanelli Town Council therefore rolled out a new Sports, Youth and Activity Service which worked with community organisations, schools, sports clubs and others, developing available services and creating new stand-alone activities free for use by residents.</p> <p>Welshpool Town Council set up a warm hub in its Town Hall as part of the national drive to provide</p>

		warm spaces in winter for local residents who may be affected by the rising cost of fuel and utility bills. The project has certainly captured the interest of the local media!

Through its informative and accessible content, the newsletter serves as an important tool in strengthening the bond between the council and its constituents.

Best Environmental Projects	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pontypridd Town Council • Blaenavon TC • Coity Higher CC • Mumbles CC 	<p>Pontypridd Town Council helped to reclaim a derelict plot of land that had been devastated by storms and threatened by invasive species. The Council worked towards Wales wide sustainability goals and encouraged biodiversity at the site, where it made significant changes and really engaged the local community. Funds from the Local Places for Nature Project played a big part.</p> <p>In 2021, Blaenavon Town Council raised concerns relating to the escalation of litter and fly-tipping that was starting to have a significant far-reaching</p>

		<p>social, environmental, and economic impact within its community.</p> <p>As a result, the Council launched the Blaenavon Heritage litter pickers Facebook group with a following of 144 members. The platform is a community information site that records litter picking events within the locality but more importantly, highlights the positive impact that regular clean ups have within the community and individuals.</p> <p>Also in 2021, the Council commenced their proactive monthly litter picking campaign which has grown in capacity, capability and through its popularity, created community engagement opportunities aligned to environmental responsibilities.</p> <p>Coity Higher Community Council, brought the community together to design and improve nature and walking in their local area on new and existing routes. Those who took part gained new skills and the project will last as an environmental, sustainable resource for generations to come.</p> <p>Mumbles Community Council showcased the remarkable synergy between Norton Nature Reserve, Clyne Community Orchard, and Oystermouth Community Garden. This triad of natural sanctuaries stands as a testament to a</p>

		collective commitment to environmental stewardship, community engagement, and the cultivation of a sustainable future.

Best Heritage Project	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Criccieth TC • Mumbles CC • Tregaron CC 	<p>Criccieth Town Council described numerous imaginative heritage community projects facilitated by the Town Council which demonstrate dedication, impact and civil engagement for the safeguarding and enhancement of cultural heritage. Highlights include activities around Remembrance and a Gown of Poppies, Friendship Benches and the magnificent Criccieth Town Tapestry.</p> <p>The Story of Mumbles project stands out as a beacon of cultural preservation and community engagement. This multifaceted endeavour weaves together the rich tapestry of Mumbles' history, fostering a deeper connection between past, present, and future generations.</p> <p>In 2022, Tregaron was home to the National Eisteddfod of Wales. For decades the National Eisteddfod used to erect a stone circle at each location as a token of the event happening in that locality but due to financial pressures this stopped many years ago. The Local Appeal Committee along with Tregaron Town Council decided to take matter into their own hands and erected their own stone circle as a reminder of this historic event. You can even enjoy a time-lapse of the build phase!</p>
